Ko te whakarewanga o tētehi kaupapa hōu ki Aotearoa nei, ki tō We Share Solar taha, me te whakahihiko i ngā hua taiao i roto i ngā kura me ngā iwi mā te whakaatu i te ngao o Tamaiterā ki ngā ākonga. E tūhonotia ana ngā kaiarahi pākihi ki ngā hōtaka mātauranga kua waihangatia ki te whakaahua i ngā māramatanga ki te āhuarangi, ki te taiao me ngā panonitanga whai hua, ki tō AinHi Earth taha. E tautoko ana mātou i te kura o Te Pā o

Rākaihautū, i Ōtautahi, me te tītoko ake i tēnei kaupapa tuatahi i waenga i te kura me te Tāhuhu o te Mātauranga. Ko te whāinga ki te hanga i tētehi pā wānanga, e whanake ai ngā tikanga ako me te ora tonu o ngā akonga Māori katoa, otinoa te whakatairanga i ngā tikanga pai ake o te

mahi tahi i waenga i te kāwanatanga mengā hapori ā-rohe.

E whakahīhī ana mātou i ngā ekenga o hō mātou hoa mahi tahi, i te poto tonu o te wā i eke hoki ai. Ka nui tonu te whakamihi i te takirua manutāiko i te tau 2022, i a Sarah Grant rāua ko Huia Lambie, i tō mātou kāhui arataki me te whakariterite hoki, i ngā hoa tata o Edmund Hillary, i hō mātou hoa mīharo, ngā puna pūtea, me ngā toa e mahi ana i ngā mahi. I tutuki ai ngā mahi katoa i tō koutou tautoko me tō koutou piripono hoki ki te kaupapa.

He roa tonu te ara kua takahia, ā, e ahu ana ki te tau kei mua i a tātou, kei tua hoki i tērā, i a tātou e mahi tahi ana kia hua mai ai ko ngā panoni whai hua. He mea nui ki a mātou te rongo i te hunga e kawe ana i ngā whāinga ōrite, me te hiahia hoki ki te mahi tahi i hēnei mahi – ngā puna pūtea, ngā hoa me ngā toa – whakapā mai. We started Kia Kotahi Ako in May of 2021 with the vision of "Indigenous knowledge transforming education and environmental solutions from Aotearoa." Today, this vision is more important than ever.

One and a half years into our partnership, we are thrilled to share the impact of our journey so far. We are also raising awareness of the ever-increasing importance of rising to opportunities for meaningful change in ways that, led by a kaupapa Māori approach, can create equitable solutions in our schools and communities.

Through 2022, our work has focused on three initiatives that support Papatūānuku (Mother Earth) and Māori education. With We Share Solar, we are sparking environmental solutions in kura, schools, and iwi by introducing the power of solar to ākonga (students) through a pilot programme being adapted for the first time in Aotearoa. Through our partnership with AimHi Earth, we are connecting business leaders to educational programmes that are designed to transform our understanding of climate and nature and create positive change. And working with Te Pā o Rākaihautū, a

kura (Māori place of learning) in Ōtautahi Christchurch, we are supporting a first-of-its-kind partnership between the kura and the Ministry of Education. The goal is to develop a new pā wānanga (learning village), improving learning and well-being for all Māori learners, and promoting better ways of working between the government and local communities.

We are so proud of our partners' achievements so far, and of our progress and successes in a short period of time. An enormous thank you to our Co-CEO's during 2022, Sarah Grant and Huia Lambie, our team of advisors and coordinators, Edmund Hillary Fellow supporters, our wonderful partners, funders, and champions of our work. Tōna paki...The story so far...

We Share Solar

- We adapted and piloted the successful US programme in a range of locations across Aotearoa New Zealand- Ōtautahi Christchurch, Tāmaki Makaura Auckland and Taranaki .
- We have tested the solar programme so far with 97 students across a range of ages at 1 primary, 2 high schools and 1 kura kaupapa Māori. (watch the pilot video).
- With our partner kura (school) in Taranaki, Te Pihipihinga Kākano Mai i Rangiātea Kura Kaupapa Māori (TPKMIR), we won the Canon Oceania award for education. We hosted the Canon team and our funding partner, The Toi Foundation, as they presented Canon cameras for students to capture their stories.

- We partnered with Orion NZ, the electricity distributor, so Ao Tawhiti students could learn about energy efficiency and solar from industry experts. (read more and watch the students in action).
- "Thank you so much to everyone who worked so hard to make this a success. It really was such a delight to be able to participate and I am excited about what next year will bring!" Pip Newland, Head of Sustainability and Risk, Orion
- We were invited to share the solar suitcases at the tribal gathering for Ngāi Tahu, Hui-ā-iwi. The solar suitcases were **re-assembled over 20 times** by visitors and used to charge mobiles.
- Newsroom filmed students at Homai school in South Auckland presenting their solar project "follow the sun, the adventures of Maui" and asking questions to solar experts, Helios (read more).
- The We Share Solar programme inspired student-led action as students measured the school roof for solar, analysed their school energy data, researched and contacted EV vans for the community to charge with school solar and drafted proposals to petition their school board for solar...watch this space...

- We received great feedback from students, teachers and our partners, confirming the huge potential for this programme.
- 95% students from the Homai primary pilot would like to do a similar project again.
- 80% students from Haeata and Homai are now more interested in solar after this project.

"How else are you going to learn if you don't try anything new?", "It was definitely unique. I feel pretty honoured to be part of this project.", "I don't find science interesting but I loved this class." "It was interesting, you don't really see much of this stuff" - Students at Haeata School

AimHi Earth

- We coordinated and hosted two taster sessions in partnership with Auckland University Executive Education and the Edmund Hillary Fellowship springboard to test the interest for the climate and nature leadership course.

He Pā Wānanga (a learning village)

- We've supported behind the scenes as this amazing organisation, Nōku Te Ao, completed the first phase of the design brief and presented it to the Ministry of Education and wider community.
- Nōku Te Ao formed an unprecedented agreement with the Ministry of Education to codesign and co-deliver this vision.
- We've worked on fundraising strategy and materials and are excited by the relationships and excitement already building.
- Planning is well underway to identify the resources and supporters that will be needed over and above what "schools" are typically funded to do. The next part will include:
 - Integrating whānau, environmental and economic wellbeing into the village of learning.
 - Designing and building Māori community facilities for the wider community to access in the arts, sciences, sports, kapa haka, whānau enterprise and innovation.
 - Developing 10 hectares of gardens and urban farming to feed 1000 people a day.
 - Restoring wetlands and the health of the surrounding waterways.
- We can't wait to share this amazing story and vision more widely this year.

 We are leveraging the Edmund Hillary Fellowship impact and policy change. We have over 18 Fellows involved as funders, project champions and staff. We co-led two events for over 100 Fellows and are co-leading Climate Action and Education group calls..

Ngā māramatanga What we are learning

We've learned huge amounts in the first 18 months, both as an organisation and personally. Some of our key learnings so far:

Through piloting the We Share Solar programme we have learned that:

- Students would like more hands-on activities as well as building the solar suitcases and experimenting with mini solar panels
- Schools can feel overwhelmed with the number of available programmes alongside their priorities so it is important to schedule carefully, link up with other programmes, align content to the curriculum and get buy-in from principals and multiple teachers.
- Partners think the current cost of the solar suitcase will be the main challenge to expanding the programme but there are lots of opportunities to design and source parts in Aotearoa.

Leave space for the magic!

We've found strategic planning and goals really helped set our direction but leaving space for magic and wisdom has led us towards unexpected impact.

We need to tackle educational and environmental challenges together. Our current system wants to separate things out into boxes and work in silos, for example categories on funding applications. When we look at it from Te Ao Māori (Māori worldview), these areas can't be separated. We're very grateful to our funders and champions who are embracing this holistic approach.

Follow the energy!

When we look for where there is the most energy for action then things will happen fast. Having patience or changing course can be more effective than pushing on when the timing or energy isn't right.

Many organisations show willingness to take bolder action on environmental challenges but then struggle to prioritise it with competing demands. We are learning lots about how to refine our communication with businesses and funders and focus on bringing people together around a shared purpose.

Join the dots

There is lots of amazing work happening across education and the environment but often it isn't joined up. The best outcomes have come when we approached partnerships in the spirit of ako, learning and teaching, to connect people and add value to what is already working.

We also shared some of our learnings about using the Open Collective Platform for fundraising and how to collaborate for impact **in their blog**.

Te ara whakamua What we are doing next

We Share Solar-solar education

Co-design the Te Ao Māori expression of the programme with Te Pihipihinga Kākano Mai i Rangiātea Kura Kaupapa Māori. Scale the programme with other kura (schools) in Taranaki.

Create a version of the solar suitcase in Aotearoa to reduce the cost of the programme.

Plan the next phase of the We Share Solar rollout in Aotearoa including sustainable funding models.



AimHi Earth- business climate course

Coordinate a climate networking event in Ōtautahi Christchurch and an online masterclass for businesses and funders in March and April .

Plan the next steps for rolling out AimHi Earth in Aotearoa to transform understanding of the climate and nature crisis.



He Pā Wānanga- a learning village

Create a film for funders to share the story and vision.

Coordinate a network of funders to drive intergenerational change for Māori education, environment and health outcomes.

Host a visit of Edmund Hillary Fellows to He Pā Wānanga to showcase their vision and create a group of funders and champions.


